MINING NEWS.

The Graphic M. & M. Co. are
erecting company buildings in Water
Canon.

Several of our prominent miners
have commenced their assessments
for 1886. This shows confidence.

Donald McRae has been engaged
in working assessments on his claim
in the Abbey district, and has made a
new location on good iron cap in the
Capitol district.

Cosme, the Water Canon veteran,
came in on Wednesday with another
load of concentrates from the Haase,
Ott & Co. concentrator, for treat-
ment at the Graphic smelter of this
city.

Capt. Day, the Superintendent of
the Graphic, examined the Graphic
Company's mines in Water Canon
and is favorably impressed with them.
He will prosecute work without loss of
time, and in a thorough manner.

The Haase, Ott & Co's concentrator
in Water Canon fired up on Friday
last, and on Sunday made their first
shipment of concentrates to this city.
The plant will now continue in opera-
tion steadily on Jane Bowman ore.

J. S. Hutchason has completed all of
his annual assessment work. He has
commenced the exploitation of the
Wade Hampton and the Slaven mines,
in the Magdalena district, and will
ship the ore to Socorro for treatment.

The Merritt Mining and Milling
Company of this city purchased 12-
000 pounds of salt from Capt. A.
Goebel. The mill drops its stamps
about the 26th of this month. The
salt came from the salt lagoons in the
northwest portion of this county.

The strike made by A. Radcliff in
Water Canon is far more important
than at first supposed. The ore, by
two mill-runs made in this city, is
found to make concentrates contain-
ing 300 ozs. silver and 3 ozs. gold per
ton of 20 tons of ore put into one of
concentrates.

Pat Laddy and M. McLeish, the
lucky miners, made another good
strike on the summits of the Magda-
lenas last week. The ore is excellent,
and the vein large and well defined.
This is another instance which goes to
show that our mountain ranges still
offer good opportunities for the
prospector.

E. Whitacre, one of the reliable
miners of the Ladrones, paid us a visit
on Tuesday. He displays excellent
argentiferous copper specimens which
came from his Lone Star mine, in the
Ladrones. F. J. Hudson has also an
interest in this mine.
