Pueblo, Colo., April 30.—The Popular state central committee has decided to recommend that the state convention be held in this city Sept. 4, under the party's candidate for United States senator.

The Bullion On Top.

Fell into the River.

Brahlov, Roumania, April 30.—A terrible accident occurred here to-day. While the pier was crowded with people in holiday attire bound for Galitz, on the Danube, the pier gave way and threw 120 people into the water. Many of them are believed to have been drowned.

Painters on Strike.

Chicago, April 30.—Two thousand painters, nearly one-half of the entire force in this city, went out on a strike to-day in accordance with a plan adopted at a meeting held yesterday. The strike is the result of an alleged lock-out instituted by master painters and stopped by the central league three weeks ago.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Members of Congress Not Anxious To Listen to Coxey Delegations—Presidential Nominations.

Washington, April 30.—There will be no Coxey talk in the house of representatives if those who direct legislation can prevent it. Resolutions bearing on Coxey's army, bills or treatment of, and hearing for Coxey delegations will be promptly referred to committees from where there will be no likelihood of the measures emerging until after the agitation subsides. The only means by which action to Coxey can be made will be through the pending appropriations bill.

WORKS Work Together.

Chicago, April 30.—The executive board of the general assembly of the Knights of Labor has set June 11, as the date for the committee representing that order to meet the committee appointed by the American Federation of Labor. The meeting will be the most important held by workingmen in years. Efforts will be made to arrive at an understanding whereby the two may work together for the general advancement of the cause of labor.
