BALDY DISTRICT.

Facts and Figures from Camps That Promise Big Returns This Summer.

Correspondence New Mexican.
Maxwell City, April 29.—The gold mines of the Moreno valley and the Creek districts are now receiving a share of attention from prospectors. These districts are forty miles in length and from six to ten miles wide. Good paying ore has been found in all parts.

The latest strike in the Baldy region is in property controlled by Trinidad parties. At a depth of 125 feet a three-foot six-inch vein of very rich ore has been opened; samples of the ore show running into the hundreds. The gentlemen interested in this mine are Dr. Chapman, J. W. Bayne, Dr. Reed, Dr. Charleston, A. F. Hollenbeck, A. C. Gaines, H. C. and W. C. Fortnam.

The Aztec is being developed by the new owners and a large body of ore has lately been opened up which runs \$10 on the plates. They are getting ready to put in a 40-stamp mill and concentrating tables.

The Claude Mining & Milling company has six claims. The French Henry has a 75-foot cross-cut tunnel, a 50-foot shaft and about 200 feet of drift on the vein. The vein has an average width of eight feet of free milling gold ore, which averages \$25 on plates. This company has a 2,700-foot bucket tramway and will put in a 30-stamp mill and concentrators this season.

Development work is going on in the Bull of the Woods and the Homestead mines. They have been developed from \$15 to \$100.

The Black Horse group owners have five claims and are cross-cutting the two veins at a depth of 750 feet.

A company has just been organized in Bates, with a capital of \$30,000, to develop the two Gortillas, Nos. 1 and 2, in Point Park, which have produced \$300 ore.

On the Elizabethtown side development work is being done in twenty-three lodes, and all show up well. Some of the product from the claims has run up to \$2,000 per ton.

The prospectors in upper Cimarron county, near the mouth of Clear creek, have named their camp Perryville and have petitioned the government to open a postoffice there to accommodate the growing population. There are now between sixty and seventy men settled there. Two claims are being developed and everything indicates a genuine camp. Charles Rando has just opened up a general store at Perryville.

The Four Creeks Mining company has five claims at the head of the Cimarron which are very heavy in oxide of iron and carry \$80 in gold. Some of it has from twenty to sixty ounces in silver and from 8 to 20 per cent of copper.

The Moreno Valley Stage company will begin the running of daily coaches between Springer and Elizabeth on Tuesday May 1. Hon. M. W. Mills and Harry Wigham are back of the stage line enterprise.

GOLDEN'S GRIST.

A Rich Strike in the San Lazarus—
Thirty Queen Shipments Good
News from South Santa
Fe County.

Golden, April 27.—There has been a very rich strike made in the San Lazarus mine which has just come to light. About three months ago Wm. Boylen, the company's agent in charge of this mine, in prospecting in the old workings broke through into a six feet lead of decomposed gold ore, which upon being washed without pulverizing yielded a return of \$300 per ton.

The ore was found on one side of what was called by the miners "Nigger Heaven." Mr. Boylen thinking that perhaps some of this loose rich ore might have been left unnoticed upon the foot wall of this room, swept it carefully, and was very much surprised to find that the fine ore so obtained was even richer than that in the recently discovered lead.

When this mine was last worked the ore was shoveled down through this room, and it is now supposed that in so handling the fine particles of rich ore settled to the floor and was overlooked.

The finding of this last named ore has explained the cause of the surprising and somewhat unsatisfactory returns from the stamp mill heretofore, as the ore when sampled from the lead gave better results by far than those received, when the same ore was put through the mill.

This pleasing discovery together with the new find of the large body of rich ore which will be so easily treated has decided the owners to commence operations on a large scale soon, and when they do this camp will have another great gold bullion producer in the San Lazarus.

The owners of the Olney Queen have very nearly a carload of their rich ore on the dump. As soon as they have a full car load it is understood that they will send it to the smelter for treatment. Everybody is anxiously awaiting the time when the above plan is carried out, in order to know how the returns compare with the test assays.

James H. Lucas has again started up his stamp mill, after a shut down of four weeks, caused by the breaking of the ore crusher. He has replaced the same and has put in new and better stamp heads and came and made other necessary improvements. He is now able to put through more ore in twenty-four hours, and expects a big return from his next clear-up.

A. J. Weatherford, of Cleopatra, Ohio, is here looking after his valuable interests in the Perry gulch.

Mr. T. A. Hathaway, the Colorado mining expert, took in this camp this week and was well pleased with what he saw.

We are always glad to welcome such men as Mr. Hathaway, he being a practical and well informed mining man, and his opinion is valuable to us, for his influence has its weight. When such men see that we have plenty of good mineral, and to express themselves, it has good effect in mining circles.
